The Mission of the College is to provide its students a holistic guidance in the field of academics, career opportunities and extracurricular activities so that they grow to their full potential. Since most of our students are first generation learners and belong to the economically unprivileged section of the population, our mission is to train and guide them towards the path of a prosperous career and financial independence. The emancipation of the girl student is also one of the missions of the college.

The vision of the college is to make available affordable higher education to the socially and economically deprived sections of society who are mostly the first-generation learners. The college also aims to provide holistic education to the economically underprivilged section of the society and to make their dream of higher education come true so that they can become responsible citizens of tomorrow and make a significant contribution to the development of the society.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

As an affiliated college of the West Bengal State University, Barasat, the College follows the University prescribed curriculum. To ensure that the academic programs and institutional goals of the College are integrated, and to supplement the University's Curriculum, the College organizes various co-curricular activities keeping in mind the benefits of the students. These give students opportunities to interact with eminent speakers and experts from various inter-disciplinary fields. The teachers constantly strive to integrate important issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. in their individual lectures in the classroom. Students are encouraged to participate in projects, seminars and class room presentations that address the issues relevant in today's globalizing world. Besides this, the College maintains multiple activities and interactive Committees. Feedback on curriculum obtained from students, stakeholders and academic peers have facilitated innovative initiatives and ensured continuous growth. Sincere efforts have been made by the institution to modify and enrich the curriculum in order to make it cater to the dynamic, employable market. IQAC of the College, along with the Academic Committee monitors and evaluates the quality of its enrichment programme.

The college has undertaken several measures to ensure the smooth running of the curriculum by conducting online classes on Google Meet and by uploading reading materials in google classroom. Subject wise Whats App groups have been created to ensure uninterrupted interaction with the students during the lockdown. Exams were also conducted online and the soft copies of the exam scripts were evaluated to facilitate the timely publication of exam results.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college focuses on the continuous improvement of the teaching-learning experience through the adaptation and implementation of ICT (Information and Communication Technology) resources. Smart classrooms have been constructed to facilitate the e-learning process with the use of laptops and projectors. Special efforts are made to cater to the students with diverse learning abilities. Special lectures are also organized from time to time by inviting resource person of other institutions to encourage the diversity of the learning experience. Tutorials are conducted particularly for the slow learners to help them overcome their shortcomings and to keep pace with the curriculum. Special coaching classes in spoken English, basic Mathematics and basic Computer are organized for the students to equip them for the competitive examinations. Add-on courses in Communicative English, Disaster Management and Counselling and Guidance have been conducted to give the

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students a learning experience of subjects which lie outside the syllabus. Interactive techniques of instruction such as projects and presentations are adopted to encourage independent and investigative thinking amongst the students. Continuous internal evaluation is conducted in the form of tests, assignments, projects etc to evaluate the students. Faculty enrichment programmes such as Faculty Induction Programme, Refresher course and short term courses are attended by the faculty at regular intervals for professional development, competence and adequacy.

Wi-Fi provided to students, teachers and staff members has enabled the smooth functioning of the teaching-learning process and administrative work of the College. The faculty and the library of the College ensure procurement of the latest books, journals and magazines in the library. The College has subscribed to NLIST so that the teachers and students can access a huge stock of learning resources on internet.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The emphasis in the research, consultancy and extension activities of the College is on

the holistic development of the students and on shaping the young minds those can make a difference to the community and the environment. Over the last few years the

institution has taken initiative in promoting research among its faculty and in nurturing a spirit of research culture among its students. The College motivates teachers to undertake projects and the institution provides all support to enable implementation of research schemes. Three of our faculty members have completed their Ph.D while in service in last five years. One faculty members has submitted doctoral thesis and three teachers have registered for Ph.D Programme during

this period. To promote research aptitude amongst the students the college organizes interdisciplinary students' seminar where the students prepare power point presentations on interdisciplinary topics. The College has also taken initiative to organize an Interdisciplinary Students' Seminar where the students from all departments present papers on topic from their curriculum. As a part of their curriculum, students of Commerce and Economics stream have to undertake research projects under the guidance of their teachers.

The College is constantly striving towards making its students socially aware and dutiful. A workshop has been organized for SC, ST, OBC and minority community. Various activities are undertaken by the NSS Units of the college such as health awareness, blood donation camps, gender sensitisation. The college provided shelter to the people of the neighbouring community during "Amphan" and "Yaas" super cyclones. As part of the extension activities of the college, the NSS Units distributed saplings, fruits and food packets to the patients of the New Barrackpur Municipality.

The College library houses large number of books and journals on a variety of subjects. E-resources are available for the students and teachers. The College library provides hundreds of books, journals and huge amount of e-resources through its Wi-Fi internet facility for both the faculty members and students within the campus. The College also arranges for books/journals/data or any other resource to its students if required. The students can use desktop computers provided by the College for them for the projects. Initiative has also been taken for institutional subscription of the UGC scheme N-LIST (National Library and Information services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) for access to hundreds of online international and national journals and e-books by the teachers and students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College continuously strives to create and provide suitable infrastructure to its students and staff. This College, after it was established in 1966, was situated near New Barrackpur station and shared a building with a girls' school. As classes for the school were held in the morning shift, classes for this College were held in the evening shift up to 2007. The College has traversed a long way since then. In 2007, the College started its classes in its own new building in the day shift. This building initially had two stories. The college building has been expanded since then and now there is a four-storied building with classrooms (including smart classrooms), one auditorium, one gymnasium, and laboratories. There are separate common room for boys and girls. The College library has abundant number of books and is registered under NLIST. The students and the staff members have been given the licence to use the facilities. The students, staff and faculty members are provided computing facility through a good number of computers and an equal number of allied accessories and internet connectivity along with the Wi-Fi enabled campus.

Student Support and Progression

The College has a student support cell that caters to the various needs of the students particularly pertaining to state scholarships like minorities' scholarship, SC/ST scholarship; Kanyashree ,railway concession etc. A students' support fund has been created by the Teachers' Council to provide financial assistance to the needy students. The Mentor-Mentee system has been introduced whereby each teacher is allotted a fixed number of students who regularly interact with the teacher for guidance and support. Regular mentor-mentee meetings are held to address the grievances of the students. Students are encouraged to display their original creative writings in the departmental/College wall magazine. The College publishes a magazine annually. The Internal Complaints Cell (ICC) has been constituted as per the UGC guidelines. The games and sports department of the College has won many laurels at various levels. The Alumni Association of the college has been formed to keep in touch with the ex-students and to monitor their progression into higher studies and professional fields.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Governing Body supervises the general functioning of the College as stated in Statutes, Rules and Ordinances of the West Bengal State University. The Governing Body consists of the Principal, teachers' representatives, non-teaching staff representatives, members nominated by the Government of West Bengal, members nominated by the affiliating University and students' representative (Ex-Officio, General Secretary of the Students, Union). All the representatives from teachers, students and non-teaching staff are elected in a democratic process. The Principal, teachers' representatives, non-teaching staff representatives and student representative are members of the GB. They along with the Principal provide their feedback and reviews to the GB on academic and administrative issues of the College. The GB issues directions as per its appraisal but does not intercede in activities envisioned by the departments apart from the matters of procedures, protocol and policy.

The IQAC monitors the overall quality enhancement of the college. The different committees have been formed to facilitate the smooth running of the different aspects as such academic, finance, culture, examination, sports etc. The Digital Committee has been constituted during the lockdown to monitor the online activities of the college. The leadership ensures implementation of policies and plans through constant meetings and regular engagements in the College. The Governing Body meets as and when required in order to take stock of the implementation of policies and stated mission. The Teachers' Council meets at an average of nine to ten times

annually while departmental Committees meet regularly in order to help formulate and implement plans.

Through various informal interactive channels, feedback is sought from students in order to enhance the teaching learning process. There is also an online feedback system. Parent-teachers meetings also help to get feedback from the stakeholders. All the decisions and actions of all the Committees and departments are constantly reviewed and coordinated in their meetings to ensure growth in quality and create a cult of excellence. Faculty and staff are encouraged to upgrade their academic qualities and skills in order to enhance and develop themselves. The teachers regularly update their self-appraisal reports for the processing of their CAS papers.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The objective of the practice is to develop a collaborative educational practice in the locality where all the educational institutions, families and other stakeholders work together and support each other to achieve the goal of holisticeducation for the children of the locality. When the schools, colleges and other community groups of a locality band together to support learning through actions and connections, young people achieve more in schools, stay longer in schools, larger number of them go to higher education, better prepared for the job market and moreover they grow up to be responsible citizens of the country.

The objective of "Learning beyond the Classroom" practice is to make academic learning interesting, to extend the boundaries of learning beyond the classroom and to encourage participative and experiential learning among the students. The practice aims to facilitate independent thinking, creative writing, research aptitude and to encourage peer learning and team spirit through group activities. The greater purpose of this practice is to make academic learning shift from theory to "praxis" and to promote an interdisciplinary approach to learning. All of the above objectives are in tandem with the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) which got introduced in 2018.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The college was established in 1966 as a commerce college. Over the years new subjects and disciplines were introduced to cater to the demand of the students as well as to address the need of time. The college now has emerged as a general degree college, with a noble vision of imparting higher education to the students who are mostly first generation learners coming from financially underprivileged. The institution offers mainly 2 streams i.e., Commerce and Arts and a few subjects from the Science stream. This makes it clear that NBPCM functions as a multidisciplinary institution. The college offers 12 programmes under the CBCS system of West Bengal State University. Thus, with this kind of multidisciplinary nature the college accommodates nearly 541 students. The college has already applied to the Higher Education Department of West Bengal for introducing General Programmes in Physics and Chemistry The college tries to accommodate Interdisciplinary courses in its routine framework. The students studying Arts may opt for a subject like Computer Science from the Science stream. Thus, in the context of the NEP 2020 the institution has the potential to offer Interdisciplinary and/or multidisciplinary courses.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The college is an affiliated under graduate college under the West Bengal State University. The college has to follow the syllabi and the programs as prescribed by the University. At the end of every semester the University centrally conducts the examination and awards the marks sheet to the students after being evaluated by the teachers of the same or different colleges. The total marks and the credits are in the custody of the University and the college has no scope to keep that in possession and moreover, it doesn't have the permission to allow its students free entry and exit. Since, the college does not have academic autonomy to design its programmes (except Add-on or certificate courses) or award marks or credit to the students, ABC is not possible in this institution. If in future the Government modifies and revises its rule and issue specific regulations and guidelines regarding ABC, the college will do the needful to implement this.

3. Skill development:

The CBCS enables the students to develop their skills as per the syllabus of it. In addition to that the college

offers its students free certificate and Add-on courses to enhance their skill and prepare them for the professional world. These Add-on courses are specifically designed as per their courses. Most of the departments offers Add-on courses to its students in order to enhance their skill. By observing important days like Gandhi Jayanti, Rashtriya Ekta Diwas the institution attempts to inculcate in its students not only Universal values like Truth (satya) and Non-Violence (ahimsa), righteous conduct (dharma), peace(shanti) but also citizenship values and the spirit of National Integration. A number of programmes like seminars and workshops has been organized on the issue of Gender that have addressed issues like gender inequality and discrimination As far as STEM or STEAM is concerned the college cannot take any initiative unless specific guidelines are issued by the Government or the University. But as soon as the Government issues specific orders and guidelines the college is ready to perform at its best in this aspect.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The teachers of the college deliver their lectures in bilingual mode (English and Bengali). Students studying Bengali receive class teaching in Bengali, students studying English receive lectures in English only, while students pursuing Honours and General courses in other subjects receive lectures in both English and Bengali. The College has organized Yoga workshop in order to inspire the students to explore and practice the indigenous systems of knowledge and introduce them to the Indian tradition that has successfully and effectively reconciled the physical and spiritual aspects of education. The Departments of English and Bengali teach the students Indian literatures either in translation or in the original. Department of Education introduces the students to the native systems of Education. Teachers of this institution while delivering their lessons always keep in mind the Indian approach and perspectives.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The college is highly focused to train its students in such a way that at the completion of their courses they become equipped enough to compete in the real world to secure a good job. Keeping this in view the college has planned to develop their skill through Add-on courses. The courses of the college are designed by the University as per the CBCS curriculum and the course outcomes are guided by

	the curriculum. Since, the college is an institution affiliated to the West Bengal State University and is governed by the directives of the Higher Education Department of Government of West Bengal, it does not have any autonomy to design its own curriculum except the certificate and add-on courses. But once the Government changes its rules and regulations and empower the college either to frame or modify the syllabi, necessary steps will be taken to implement the recommendations of NEP, 2020.
6. Distance education/online education:	During the recent pandemic the college offered instruction through online mode. Moreover, the college offers Add-on courses to the students in online mode. These courses are free of cost and very much their own subject specific for skill enhancement. The college plans to upgrade the courses and give the students an industry outlook to make them more competent for the job market.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Academic Calendar and Lesson Plan

- As an affiliated college of the West Bengal State University, Barasat, the College follows the University prescribed curriculum. The implementation of the curriculum is undertaken by the IQAC and the Academic Committee of the College.
- The Academic Committee prepares an Academic Calendar and time table and distributes workload among teachers to ensure systematic delivery of curriculum design. The Academic Committee decides the workload which is further implemented as per the recommendations of the IQAC and in consultation with the various Heads of Departments.
- The Teachers' Council supervises the implementation of all academic decisions in consultation with the Academic Committee. With the commencement of each academic session, the Teachers' Council issues master routine keeping in mind the University recommended teaching hour for each topic. On the basis of the master routine, the departments issue class routines to the students in accordance with the syllabi of both General and Honours courses.
- Number of classes for each topic is decided according to the syllabus and credits assigned to each topic/Group/paper etc.
- The teachers prepare lesson plans for the entire session so that the prescribed curriculum is completed within the time limit. The college ensures effective curriculum delivery through class routine, lectures, ICT enabled lectures, written test, internal assessment, attendance and tutorials.
- Departmental meetings are held regularly to review the progress towards completion of the syllabus.
- From 2018-19, the college has introduced CBCS (Choice Based Credit System) as per the guidelines of the University and UGC. This has been done with the intention of upgrading the curriculum and bringing it at par with the national standards of academic excellence.
- The college has introduced a Learning Management System (LMS) for an enhanced student centric approach towards curricular completion. Various classroom teaching methods are regularly used for the effective delivery of the curriculum. Participative learning is the primary focus of our teaching. Students are divided into smaller groups and engaged in

discussion on various topics related to their subjects.

Teaching Method

- In addition to conventional classroom teaching with chalk and duster, ICT based teaching learning methods are extensively used.
- During the pandemic, online classes were taken as per the regular routine during regular college hours by all departments. The teachers also used the LMS system of the college, Google Meet, Zoom, WhatsApp, Google Classroom, Google Forms, YouTube etc. as and when they felt necessary for the benefit of the students.

Library

- The Central Library of the college is equipped with KOHA Library Management System and NList, which help teachers and students immensely in getting necessary books, journals and eresources.
- In addition to the Central Library, all the departments maintain a departmental library to give students more access to books during the class hours.

Laboratories

• For the subjects needing practical classes like Geography, Education, Computer Science, the College has well-equipped laboratories.

Continuous Assessment

- As per WBSU guidelines, all departments have to conduct an internal examination after the stipulated hours of teaching for each semester.
- Apart from the University prescribed internal assessment, all the teachers also conduct continuous assessment through google form, quiz, assignments, projects etc.
- Internal examinations are conducted following the academic calendar.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Response:

The college does not have any scope of framing the academic curriculum and includes these issues into the curriculum. However the University prescribed syllabi of various subjects followed in our college competently integrating issues mentioned here.

- West Bengal State University incorporates Environmental Studies as one of the Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) for all undergraduate courses. So, all students of this college compulsorily study crosscutting issues relevant to environment and sustainability. This course incorporates environmental issues like natural resources management, energy management, ecosystem, biodiversity, climate, sustainability, population studies, pollution and waste management, urban and rural environment, environment management. Programmes like B.Sc in Economics and Geography address various issues related to environment and sustainability.
- The different programmes offered in the college such as English, Bengali, Economics, Political Science, History, Geography and Education effectively integrate the issues relevant to the basic understanding of the concepts related to gender like economic, political and social inequalities, gender politics, feminist and patriarchal ideas and ideologies, position of women in ancient, middle age and modern India, great women personalities of India, policies of women empowerment, legal rights of women in India, Problems of girl-child, female foeticide, declining sex ratio, gender identities and responsibilities, feminist thought, the difference between sex and gender etc.
- These programmes also incorporate an understanding of the essential concepts that lead to a cultivation of basic human values and promote a better understanding of the community and humanity as a whole. Curriculum of B.Com in Accountancy incorporates issues relevant to professional ethics such as business ethics, morality, ethical leadership and ethical dilemma.
- The subject of professional ethics has been included in the syllabus of the commerce department under the new curriculum which inculcates the primary tenets of personal and corporate standards of behavior expected by professionals

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

- Experiential learning -The college undertakes various activities at regular intervals to promote and encourage experiential learning among the students. The different departments of the college organize departmental tours, field trips, educational surveys etc. which provide the students an opportunity for learning by doing. The visits to the book fair, household surveys, educational trips help them to gain practical knowledge about the curriculum.
- Participative Learning-The college has adopted various student-centric methods such as field surveys and educational tours in relevant subjects where the focus has been on participative learning. The students are encouraged to explore the various aspects of the curriculum and seek answers through observation and experiment. Participative learning is implemented through various activities. An interdisciplinary students' seminar is also organized every year where the students make a short presentation on a topic that is interdisciplinary in nature. This promotes participative/ experiential learning and encourages their inquisitive and critical inclinations. These presentations are made in powerpoint format which ensures that the students use and learn basic computer skills as well as acquire the required degree of confidence and expertise which will equip them to make seminar presentations in future. Visit to the book fair, socio-economic survey, peer teaching, movie-screening, story-writing competition are held to promote participative learning.

- Problem Solving Methodologies-Various problem solving methodologies are adopted by the college to help the students solve problems. Separate tutorial classes are held regularly for both the advanced and the slow learners to cater with the aim of solving the specific problems faced by the students regarding the curriculum. In these tutorial classes, students are encouraged to engage in interactive and participative discussion with each other so that the method of teaching no longer remains teacher-centric. The college also has a mentor-mentee system where each teacher is assigned mentees whom they offer assistance. Besides this, home assignments and projects are given to the students to strengthen their problem solving skill as well as to encourage them to explore different resources of the college (text books, references, e-resources etc.).
- Use of ICT Tools-The college promotes extensive use of ICT Tools. The college has four smart classrooms which are equipped with overhead projectors where teachers take power point classes. The ICT tools were used extensively during the Covid 19 pandemic. Online classes were taken using google classroom, webinars were conducted which were streamed live on youtube and facebook and whatsapp groups were created for the dissemination of information among the students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Before the introduction of the CBCS system in 2018-19, the college had a well-developed mechanism for a continuous internal evaluation system. Several mediums were employed to ensure CIE such as class tests, unit tests and selection tests.

- The system of continuous evaluation is an inherent component of the CBCS system which has been implemented from 2018-19. After that, the continuous evaluation system has become more organized and formal. An internal assessment examination is held as prescribed by the CBCS curriculum. This examination comprises one-third of the weightage of the total marks of each subject for each semester. At the end of each semester, the University conducts an end-semester examination. Apart from this University prescribed system of evaluation, the college conducts class tests, quiz, home assignments and projects on a regular basis to further strengthen the process of continuous evaluation.
- The internal assessment of the college is transparent. Some methods and procedures keep this system transparent and robust. The process of making the students aware of the evaluation system is done through the following ways:
- An orientation programme is held on the first day of the session for the first year students to inform them about the various aspects of the evaluation process.
- Notices are put up informing the students about the upcoming examinations and time table.

- An elaborate Academic calendar containing the probable dates of Unit Tests and Selection Tests is provided to the students at the commencement of every session.
- The students get a clear idea about the theory and practical syllabi of all subjects from the website of the parent university i.e. West Bengal State University, Barasat.
- The Library of the college also provides university prescribed syllabi and the question papers of the previous year.
- The students get an elaborate Academic calendar and a Lesson Plan indicating the probable dates of the tests to be held throughout the year at the beginning of the session.
- The scope of the college to deal with examination related grievances is limited in the case of university exams since the entire mechanism related to the review of scripts, RTI and special review is done by the university in cases where the candidate makes such an appeal. The college however, extends full support to the examinees by making all the relevant information available regarding review and RTI.
- With regard to the internal examination conducted by the college, any grievance is taken up seriously and accorded due importance although very few such cases are reported. The college has an exam grievance portal through which students can lodge their grievance. The examination sub-committee is also entrusted with the responsibility of looking into all matters related to examination.

The college runs degree programmes in various subjects under three broad categories namely,

Bachelor in Arts, Bachelor in Science and Bachelor in Commerce with separate Honours and General programmes for each category. Students graduating after the three year degree programme are expected to acquire some generic skills that students of all disciplines should be able to acquire. Some of these programme outcomes in general are as follows:

- Acquirement of basic employability enriching skills such as communication, computer knowledge, problem solving ability, analytical and reasoning aptitude.
- Basic communicative and writing skills in English and one modern Indian language (Bengali).
- Fundamental knowledge regarding the environment, sustainability and the ecosystem. In depth study of two or three subjects of their own choice.
- Ability to discern the interdisciplinary nature of epistemology.
- Problem solving and analytical skills in the subject chosen for study.
- Ability to apply their skill and problem solving capacity in the fields of industry, corporate and social sectors and other allied professional fields.
- Inculcation of cultural and moral values and social ethics which equips them to take a fair stand vis a vis issues of social, cultural and moral importance.
- Awareness of the surrounding socio-economic and cultural diversity which helps to increase their acceptance of diversity.
- Development of a strong community feeling and the growth of a helpful and cooperative attitude that enhances the team spirit.

The college has a well framed mechanism for communicating the Pos and Cos to the teachers and the students. The programme specific outcomes and course outcomes have been meticulously drafted by our teachers in a scientific and organized manner. These have been displayed on the college website so that the students have access to them and can choose from various options according to their interests, aptitude and professional goals. Apart from this the same is communicated to the students in the classroom by the teachers at regular intervals.

The college has a multi-pronged mechanism for measuring attainment of Pos, PSOs and Cos. Apart from the regular evaluation method such as class tests and mid term examinations, the students are made to undergo several evaluative exercises such as group discussions, mock interviews, role playing, aptitude and psycho-analytical tests. The Academic Committee conducts meetings where the departmental representatives report the attainment of POs and COs. There is a mechanism for collecting feedback from the students regarding the attainment of the POs and COs which help in

assessing the attainment of the POs and COs.

The importance of community service is impressed upon the students of the College as it is the mission of the College to impart holistic education creating socially aware responsible citizens who can contribute substantially to the well-being of society.

- The institution has several Committees like the NSS and Cultural Committee which involve the students in their varied social activities.
- Every year the NSS of the college along with the Students' Union arranges a Voluntary Blood Donation camp in which not only our students and teachers but also people of the locality

participate enthusiastically.

- The NSS conducts various awareness camps throughout the year. These camps spread awareness regarding issues such as Aids, Thalassemia awareness and screening programme, cancer awareness ,eye check up camp, free health camp, mental health awareness programme, dengue awareness programme, traffic awareness among the people of the neighbouring area. These camps are also held in the nearby schools.
- The NSS undertakes cleaning programmes under the "Swachh Bharat" programme. The students of our college enthusiastically participate in cleaning missions in the college campus or nearby areas. Also these cleaning missions are conducted in the nearby school campuses.
- The NSS unit of the College conducts an Annual Camp every year. During this Camp, the students perform a socio-economic survey in the locality to collect some important data that reflects the socio-economic structure of the neighbouring community. During this survey, students directly interact with the people of the locality to make them aware regarding various hygiene and social issues.
- Celebration of important occasions like Republic Day, Independence Day, Netaji Birthday, Vernacular day, Teachers' Day is held to ensure the promotion of the augmented citizenship role. Students are also actively involved in the cultural programmes held during the Annual Freshers' Welcome ceremony, Rabindra Jayanti, International Vernacular Day etc.
- The NSS unit of the college conducts a Cultural Competition for the children of local slum area. In this event, the children of the locality enthusiastically participate and show their talent in different cultural activities.
- Under the supervision of their teachers, our students put up posters for general awareness about the environment and as a whole keep the College clean and green. The College thus inculcates the ideal of good citizenship in the minds of the students ensuring their active involvement in different aspects of the society.
- The College conducted a Cultural competition for school students of the locality in which more than 100 students of almost 20 schools of the locality participated enthusiastically. The successful participants are awarded in a prize distribution ceremony.
- The NSS volunteers carried out immense relief work in the locality in the wake of the destruction caused by the cyclone "Amphan". The college building offered shelter to the people of the neighbourhood whose homes were ravaged by the cyclone. The NSS units arranged for food, medicine, clothes and other essentials for the Amphan refugees.
- Green society works towards promoting the ethos of preservation and protection of our environment and to instill a feeling of responsibility for a better, greener, and cleaner environment through initiatives like plantation drives, competitions (online and Offline), and sale of plastic alternatives, talks by eminent speakers, excursions, screening of documentaries

and campaigns on social media, etc.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 Availability of adequate infrastructure and physical facilities viz., classrooms, laboratories, ICT facilities, cultural activities, gymnasium, yoga centre etc. in the institution

Response:

- The College continuously strives to create and provide suitable infrastructure to its students and staff. This College, after it was established in 1966, was situated near New Barrackpur station and shared a building with a girls' school. As classes for the school were held in the morning shift, classes for this College were held in the evening shift up to 2007. The College has traversed a long way since then. In 2007, the College started its classes in its own new building in the day shift.
- The college has wi-fi facility and a fairly adequate infrastructure to cater to the needs of the students, teachers and other staff members in order to provide an environment that is conducive to a holistic teaching and learning. The extension of the college building has recently been completed.
- Classrooms-The college has a total of 39 classrooms which includes 4 smart classrooms. All the classrooms have an adequate number of benches and tables. The smart classrooms are equipped with projectors, laptops, microphone and smart boards.
- Some of the rooms are dedicated for specific purposes such as Alumni Association Room, Sick Room, Guard Room, Store Room, Gymnasium, Canteen, Students' Union Room, Psychological Counselling Room, Teachers' Room, Office, Principal's Room, IQAC Room, Accounts Room and Girls' Common Room.
- Laboratories-The college has a computer laboratory with 12 and a geography laboratory with 1 computer.

- Gymnasium-The college has a modern well-equipped gymnasium. The gymnasium is equipped with facilities such as sports xplode trainer, manual roller treadmill, exercise cycle, weight lifting set consisting of a flat bench, weight lifting plates and dumbbell.
- Indoor and Outdoor Games-The college has facilities for both outdoor and indoor games as well as a fully equipped modern state of the art multi gymnasium. 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance and leadership is in accordance with vision and mission of the institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participation in the institutional governance

Response:

Vision and Mission of the College

- The Vision of the College is to make available affordable higher education to the socially and economically deprived sections of society who are mostly the first generation learners.
- The Mission of the College is to provide its students holistic guidance in the field of academics, career opportunities and extracurricular activities so that they grow to their full potential. Since most of our students are first generation learners and belong to the economically unprivileged section of the population, our mission is to train and guide them towards the path of a prosperous career and financial independence. The College aspires to reach greater academic heights in the near future. To achieve this, the governance system of the college follows some strategies:

Governance of the College

- The Governing Body supervises the general functioning of the College as stated in Statutes, Rules and Ordinances of UGC, West Bengal State University and Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal.
- The Governing Body consists of the Principal, teachers' representatives, non-teaching staff representatives, members nominated by the Government of West Bengal, members nominated by the affiliating University and students' representative. All the representatives from teachers, students and non-teaching staff of the Governing Body are elected in a democratic process.
- The entire onus of academic and administrative monitoring of the institute is devolved upon several committees such as Academic Committee, Admission Committee, Finance Committee, Cultural Committee, Sports Committee, Student Support Committee, Digital Support Committee. Environment Awareness Committee and Examination Committee. Members of these committees are appointed from teachers, non-teaching staff and students.
- As the mission of the college is to guide and help the students to become financially independent in future, several workshops and training programmes are conducted for them. Compulsory computer training has been included in the curriculum of the college.

Policy of Decentralization

- The college practices the policies of decentralization and participative management. The assurance of a decentralized non-hierarchical and a genial approach of academic governance is realized through the accessible constitutions of the Governing Body, which guarantee participative management.
- The Governing Body delegates the entire onus of academic, financial and cultural activities to various committees that work under the supervision of the Principal.
- The college authority formulates common working procedures and entrusts the implementation through departments.
- The Heads of department manages the day to day activities of the department and keeps a track of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the College.
- Furthermore, the members of various Committees of the College like Finance Committee, Academic Committee, Examination Committee, Library Committee, Cultural Committee and Sports Committee are appointed by the Governing Body and operate under conveners selected by the Governing Body.
- Selection of the members of the different Committees is based on the individual quality of the members as well as active participative management.
- Participative management is also acquired through the principle of delegation and active participation of members of various Committees. The Teachers' Council, comprising all full-time, part-time and guest teachers, suggests the Principal on all academic matters.

The Organizational Structure of the College consists of the Governing body, the Principal, the

teaching staff, the non-teaching staff and the students.

The Governing Body is the highest decision-making body that is in constant touch with the Principal and supervises the general functioning of the College as stated in Statutes, Rules and Ordinances of the West Bengal State University.

- The Governing Body consists of the Principal, teachers' representatives, non-teaching staff representatives, members nominated by the Government of West Bengal, members nominated by the affiliating University and students' representative (Ex-Officio, General Secretary of the Students, Union).
- All the representatives from teachers, students and non-teaching staff are elected in a democratic process. The academic functioning of the College is directed by the Academic Committee under the general supervision of the IQAC.
- The Governing Body meets at least thrice a year to discuss issues relating to finance, infrastructure, faculty recruitment and the matters related to the overall development of College.

The Principal is assisted by the IQAC, different committees, Teachers' Council, all the Departments, teachers and non-teaching staff.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) formulates and implements academic and administrative policies towards realization of the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance. The IQAC plays an important role for monitoring the internal quality of the institution. It also frames an Action Plan at the beginning of each academic session and continuously monitors the progress of the Action Plan.

The Academic Committee oversees and ensures implementation of the policies and plans set by the IQAC, through other various Committees of the College. It also constantly interacts with the departments to ensure academic accountability. The Academic Committee prepares a time table and distributes workload among teachers to ensure systematic delivery of curriculum design.

The Finance Committee looks after the financial matters of the college; the Purchase Committee monitors all decisions related to the purchase of various items; the Building committee oversees matters related to the construction activities of the college; the Examination Committee looks after all matters related to both the University and internal exams; the Admission Committee supervises matters related to online admission; the NSS committee conducts matters related to the functioning of the NSS Units of the college; the Sports and Tour Committee oversees the conduct of tours and sports; the Cultural Committee is in charge of the organization of various cultural activities and the celebration of special occasions.

The other committees - Building Committee, Examination Committee, Admission Committee, NSS Committee, Sports, Environment Awareness Committee, Digital Support Committee, Tour Committee, Cultural Committee ensure execution of the policies and plans of the College.

The Teachers' Council is a statutory body comprising all teachers and Principal of the college and holds regular meetings to discuss various matters. Since the college is under the jurisdiction of West Bengal State University and it is a state government aided higher education institution and as it is included under 2(f), 12 (b) of UGC, service rules and procedures are all framed as per University statute, Higher Education Department, Govt of West Bengal and and UGC. - Faculty members are promoted for self development programs (Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses, Short term courses) and higher education (M.Phil, Ph.D etc.)
- Leave given to teaching staff to participate and present papers and to the non-teaching staff for participation in Conference/ Seminars/ Workshops/ FDP,etc.

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Institutional Strategies for optimal utilization of resources:

- The College gets financial assistance from the Government in the form of salary grants.
- The salary grants are spent on the staff members as per the norms of the Government and every year the assessment has been done by the Director and the Joint Director of Higher Education Office.
- Apart from the salary grants the Institution also gets the non-salary grants (Bonus) at a stipulated rate given by the Government. This grant is utilized according to the ceiling mentioned each and every item.
- Fees from students for regular and add-on courses are also another source of resources.
- The college has also received funds from MP LAD and MLA LAD.
- Mobile towers from a private telecom service provider have been installed on the roof of the College building in order to mobilize additional resources.
- Once the funds are mobilized from various sources the Finance Committee takes up the responsibility for utilization of the same. The annual budget is proposed and discussed in the Finance committee. The Committee also considers the proposals related to purchase and maintenance of books, furniture, equipment, building etc. sent by other committees. After discussion of these proposals in the meeting of the Finance committee, recommendations are sent to the Governing Body for the final approval. Once the GB approves the proposed expenditure, the responsibility is taken up by the Purchase Committee.

This institution conducts external financial audit on a regular basis. Mechanism for Internal Audit and External Audit is as follows.

Internal Accounts Checking System

- Internal accounts checking is a continuous process which ensures proper documentation of each and every financial transaction on a regular basis. The college itself carries out the initial stage of internal audit.
- The regular income-expenditure is closely monitored by the administrative staff and Bursar. This is again scrutinized by the Finance Committee and the Principal for clarity, authenticity, transparency and financial accuracy.
- The College does not have an Accountant right now since the previous Accountant retired. The Income/Expenditure is closely monitored by the Bursar, the Principal and Finance Committee. The Institution is going through an acute financial crunch, so it follows the strategy of restraint as far as the expenditure is concerned.
- For any purchase, proper procedure for purchases is adopted. The Institution has formed a Purchase Committee for the purpose. For a small amount of purchase, Quotations are called for and prices are compared. For large purchases, e-tenders are called for and proper procedure is followed.
- For the grants received from various government and non-government sources, utilization certificates are prepared according to the allowed expenditure under various heads.

External Audit:

- The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure are checked. The vouchers and proper record with the concerned Department of the capital expenditure is also checked and verified.
- For external audit, books of accounts are prepared under the supervision of the Finance Committee and the Bursar.
- The book of accounts so prepared are audited by statutory auditors (appointed by the state government).
- The Utilisation Grant Certificates are also audited by the external auditor.
- The statutory auditors thereafter prepare and submit an audit report with audit observations.
- The Governing Body takes the said report into consideration and the same is then

communicated to the Government of West Bengal.

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6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The primary concern of the IQAC has been implementation of a proper strategy to provide quality and affordable education to the students, even during the unusual situation like the pandemic. The IQAC plays a pivotal role in enhancing the quality of the academic and co-curricular endeavours of the College in keeping with its vision and mission.

IQAC achieves this through the following practices,

- The college Learning Management System (LMS) was introduced by the IQAC to provide and track learning resources to students. It enables communication of academic plans, lecture notes, video lessons etc.
- During the pandemic, the IQAC ensured through the Academic Committee that regular classes are not hampered and online live classes were conducted through google -meet and zoom.
- Students are in constant touch with the college and the academic body through the Mentormentee system which is very much active and effective in the college.
- The college has subscribed G-suit for online classes, which had been extremely effective in continuing teaching-learning during the pandemic.
- IQAC has taken initiatives to set up smart classrooms with projectors and to ensure that teachers use ICT tools of teaching whenever necessary and applicable.

- Add-on courses are regularly organized by various departments under the supervision of the IQAC.
- The Internal and external examinations are conducted as per the WBSU norms. During the pandemic, an online evaluation process was developed through which Online examinations were taken for internal as well as University examinations. Students can download question papers uploaded by the University and college teachers, write the answers and upload the scripts either through emails or through Google form. The teachers check the scripts online and evaluation is made.
- IQAC organizes workshops to train teachers, librarians and non-teaching staff in developing their skills in classroom pedagogy and contemporary online library facilities like NLIST.
- The IQAC has developed a mechanism of collecting feedback from stakeholders like students, parents, staff and alumni to facilitate teaching-learning reforms. This helps in obtaining an unbiased and honest opinion about institutional performance especially in academics.
- The IQAC organized seminars and workshops for students and encouraged the students to prepare their project presentations using power-point slides in addition to completion of their assignments and class tests.

BEST PRACTICE I - "CONNECTING OUR LEARNERS"

1. Title of the Practice

"Connecting our Learners"

1. Objectives of the Practice

The objective of the practice is to develop a collaborative educational practice in the locality where all the educational institutions, families and other stakeholders work together and support each other to achieve the goal of holistic education for the children of the locality. When the schools, colleges and other community groups of a locality band together to support learning through actions and connections, young people achieve more in schools, stay longer in schools, larger number of them go to higher education, better prepared for the job market and moreover they grow up to be responsible citizens of the country.

1. The Practice

- 1. A seminar was organized on "Role of a Higher Educational Institute in the socio-economic development of the Locality". All the Heads of the institutions of the schools and colleges were invited and they actively participated in the seminar.
- 2. Before the implementation of the CBCS system, a convention was arranged in the college where Head Masters and Head Mistresses of the schools were invited. The features of the new system CBCS was explained to them in simplified manner.
- 3. The college participated in the local bookfairs and flower shows etc. where our students organized

exhibitions and help desks.

- 4. Every year, the college organizes inter-school cultural competition for the students of the neighbouring locality. The young learners of the schools enthusiastically participate in cultural events like dance, drama, recitation, debate etc. This event has been conducted through online mode during the pandemic. This inter-school cultural competition has not only helped the college to get the attention from the local students, but also prepared a forum for the local learners and educators of all levels where they can exchange their views and communicate to each other to resolve the issues they face locally.
- 5. An institution of Higher Education cannot deny its responsibility towards the society or the community, particularly of the locality in which it is situated. The College is located in an area which is economically underprivileged and there are some slums where the poor children do not get the opportunity to cultivate and express their talents. The NSS unit of the College organizes cultural competition for the children from poor and underprivileged section of the locality. The NSS volunteers visit the slum areas adjacent to the College and run a campaign for the cultural competition, talk to the parents and escort the children to the College. The volunteers and the teachers cooperate to organize the programme successfully and the teachers are assigned the duty of judging the events.
- 6. Students of the local schools are invited to participate in several college programmes like gender sensitization programmes or mental health awareness programmes.
- 7.A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) has been signed with the local administrative body New Barrackpore Municipality to involve the local administration in the process and strengthen the goal of achieving a community-based education model.
- 8. Memorandum of Understandings (MOU) have also been signed with colleges of the neighbourhood area.

BEST PRACTICE II - "LEARNING BEYOND THE CLASSROOM"

Title of the Practice

"Learning beyond the Classroom"

Objectives of the Practice

The objective of "Learning beyond the Classroom" practice is to make academic learning interesting, to extend the boundaries of learning beyond the classroom and to encourage participative and experiential learning among the students. The practice aims to facilitate independent thinking, creative writing, research aptitude and to encourage peer learning and team spirit through group activities. The greater purpose of this practice is to make academic learning shift from theory to "praxis" and to promote an interdisciplinary approach to learning. All of the above objectives are in tandem with the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) which got introduced in 2018.

The Practice

The college encourages participative and experiential learning among the students by conducting "Learning beyond the Classroom" activities. A wide range of programmes and activities are organized where each and every student can participate and get an opportunity to explore the wider horizons of knowledge which lie beyond the confines of the classroom.

- 1. An interdisciplinary students' seminar is organized every year where students from all departments deliver power point presentations on topics of common interest. The presentations are judged by external experts who are invited as judges. A question answer session is conducted at the end of each presentation where the paper presenters have to answer questions asked by the judges and the members of the audience. These presentations hone the research aptitude, interdisciplinary approach and independent thinking of the students. All students who present their papers are given participation certificates and prizes are awarded to the rank holders. This helps in building a healthy competitive spirit among the students.
- 2. A story-writing competition is held where the students are divided into groups of two and are given a topic on which they have to write a story. This promotes the skill of creative writing, thinking and team spirit among the students. They are encouraged to extend the boundaries of their thought and imagination beyond the confines of their academic curriculum. The students have to read their self-written stories at the end of the contest and the best ones are awarded prizes by the judges.
- 3. The college has a movie club named "NBPCM Cine Club" which arranges for regular movie-screening sessions for the students where they are shown different kinds of movies, documentaries etc. that are relevant to their syllabus so that they can gain an audio-visual experience which goes a long way in enhancing their understanding of the curriculum. Cinema also helps the students in acquiring an understanding of the interdisciplinary approach whereby the medium of the text gets translated into the medium of the cinema.
- 4. The college also organizes regular visits to the bookfair where the college faculty accompany the students to help them get a real-life experience of the way books gets written, printed, published and sold. These visits are indeed an extension of learning beyond the classroom.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The distinctiveness of the college lies in its prioritization of student-teacher bonding which goes hand in hand with its motto of imparting holistic education to the students. Naba Barrackpur Prafulla

Chandra Mahavidyalaya believes not only in imparting pedagogic learning but also in inculcating value education through the cultivation of human values such as prem, satya, ahimsa, shanti all of which are also the hallmarks of the New Education Policy. The college firmly believes in the theory that students are the decision makers of the future and a student with a strong mind and a soft heart can truly contribute towards the betterment of the community and the nation.

Since our college is located in an economically backward region, most of our students are first generation learners. They seek admission in our college with high hopes and aspirations. Hence, it is needless to say that imparting education to the students and following the curriculum is not the only duty of the teachers. Teachers play the role of mentors, guides and co-sympathizers which goes a long way in creating a very strong student-teacher bonding.

Student Centric and Participative Learning-Special emphasis is given on student-centric and participative learning methods so that the students take an active role in the learning process and do not merely remain passive learners. Various activities are undertaken to promote participative learning among the students such as movie-screening, interdisciplinary students' seminar, peer teaching, story-writing competition, visit to the book fair etc. This leads to an increased interaction between the students and the teachers which further fosters the student-teacher bonding. A friendly bonding is developed between the teacher and the students to make the students feel free and at home.

Mentor-Mentee System-The college has an active "Mentor-Mentee" system which facilitates a greater intimacy between the students and the teachers. In this system all the students are equally grouped in numbers under the guidance of the faculty, who treat them according to their necessities. The students feel free to approach their mentors regarding all kinds of problems that they fight face both in the college and outside and the mentors help them overcome those problems through proper guidance, support and counselling. Menor-Mentee meetings are held at regular intervals to keep track of the grievances of the mentees and to resolve them. Besides this, Whats App groups have also been formed with the mentees to remain in constant touch with them. This system ensures that the mentors know each of their mentees personally.

Student Concession-The college takes special care of the needy students so that they might have bright prospects. A Teacher's Fund has been created to provide financial assistance to these students. The COVID-19 pandemic has been particularly hard for the economically underprivileged section of the society and keeping in mind the financial hardships of our students, the college has undertaken a "COVID-19 Scheme" to offer concessions to those students who have not received any other scholarship. These steps taken by the college have helped in strengthening the student-teacher bonding.

Parent-Teacher Meeting-The college strongly believes that the student's progress depends on the care of their parents also. Thus the parent-teacher meetings are held at regular intervals so that the parents remain informed about the progress of their wards. This helps in building a very healthy and cordial relationship between the teachers and the extended family of the students.

Special Care for Slow Learners-The college pays special attention to the needs of the slow learners and the physically challenged students. Special classes are held for the benefit of the slow learners. The teachers are available even outside of class hours to help students with their doubts.

Students Whats app group-Students Whats app groups were created during the pandemic to remain in touch with the students and to share study material with them. This helped in taking the student-teacher bonding one step further.

Psychological Counselling Cell-Another very important aspect of the student-teacher bonding is the psychological counselling that is offered through the Psychological Counselling Cell of the college. The college has signed a MOU with an NGO named "Habra Taranga" to provide psychological counselling to the students, to conduct workshops on mental health etc. The college has also conducted various programmes and add-on courses in this regard.

Student Welfare Committee-The college has an active Student Welfare Committee to take care of students' needs. This committee conducts various programmes to make students aware of the welfare schemes and government scholarships that are available for them such as Kanyashree, Swami Vivekananda Scholarship, Student Credit Card Scheme etc. The students are encouraged to avail these schemes and both the teachers and the non-teaching staff help them in this regard. The establishment of the Student Welfare Committee has played a crucial role in laying the foundation of a strong student-teacher relationship.

Cultural Programmes-Various cultural programmes such as Teacher's Day, "Basanto Utsav", "Bhasha Divas", "Baishe Shrabon" etc are organized in the college which provides an opportunity for a close interaction between the students and the teachers. The students and the teachers jointly participate in these programmes which lends a special warmth to these programmes.

Though it is true that the college has still to go a long way in terms of student enrollment, the silver lining is that the student-teacher ratio is very good which is a very good figure and which facilitates the creation and cultivation of a strong student-teacher bonding.

It was located near New Barrackpur Railway station. The college was shifted to its current location in the year 2007 and was renamed as Naba Barrackpur Prafulla Chandra Mahavidyalaya in the year 2005. The college celebrate its golden jubilee in the year 2016.

Concluding Remarks:

Naba Barrackpur Prafulla Chandra Mahavidyalaya, inspite of all its limitations, has traversed a long way in terms of infrastructure but owing to poor student enrolment, the faculty as well as the students are suffering a decline in morale. Since despite being established in the year 1966, the college is yet to receive NAAC accreditation, a lot depends on the accreditation process, the preparation for which is under progress. The college primarily suffers from poor student enrolment as mentioned earlier and shortage of funds. The primary focus of the college currently is to receive NAAC accreditation so that it can overcome its shortcomings and improve both student enrollment and the financial scenario.
